A Big Local Gateshead project for local people

Park *Life* is an exciting new artwork funded by Big Local Gateshead and created by local children working with artist, Tommy Anderson, and writer, Paul Summers.

Sited at Charlton Walk Park in Teams, Gateshead, **Park *Life*** explores the people, places and history of the area. Inspired by the stories of local people, archive images of Teams and Bensham, and aspirations of the children themselves, the artwork is a poetic insight into the rich culture and heritage of Gateshead.

This booklet showcases the complete artwork and also documents the creative processes used to produce it.

Big Local Gateshead is a community project working to improve the local area and the lives of the people living in it. Following consultations with local residents a key theme to emerge was that people wanted green-spaces and park-sites to be improved. With this in mind Big Local Gateshead commissioned Baseline Shift to work with three local primary schools in the Teams and Bensham area to design a new artwork for Charlton Walk Park. Big Local Gateshead also worked with Network Rail who cleaned up the site in preparation for the work being installed.

We hope that this is just the first step in terms of brightening up the local area and helping to breathe life back into an unloved local park.

Tommy Anderson (Baseline Shift) is an experienced arts facilitator and graphic designer, managing and delivering progressive participatory and educational arts programmes inspired by his practice. He is passionate about providing creative opportunities for those who wouldn't usually have access to the arts, enabling communities to explore a wide range of artistic processes to gain understanding, enjoyment and reward from what they are doing.

Paul Summers is a poet and writer who has facilitated numerous socially engaged creative projects across the North of England in educational and community contexts. He has also written for TV, Radio, Film and Theatre and has collaborated many times with artists on mixed-media and public art projects.

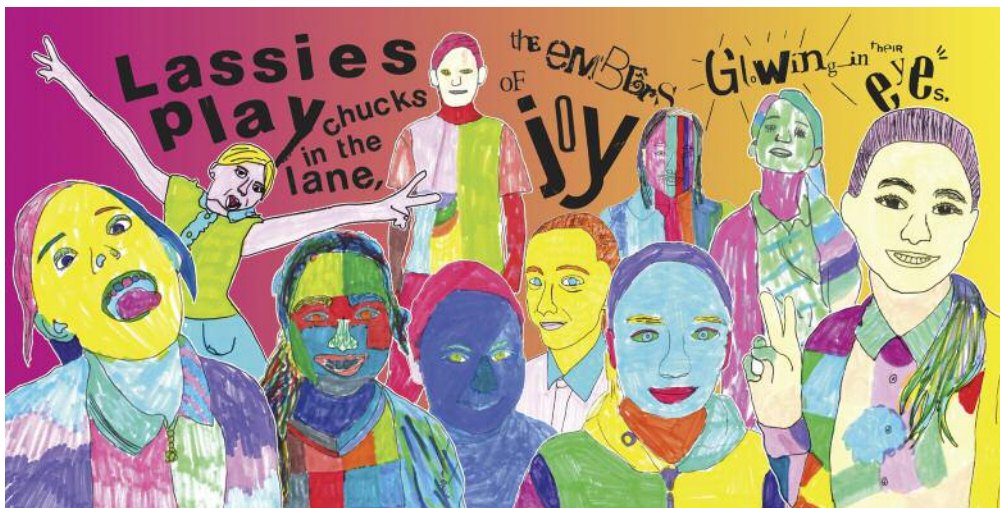
Bensham is a huge mountain of chimneys and bricks,
Etched with history.



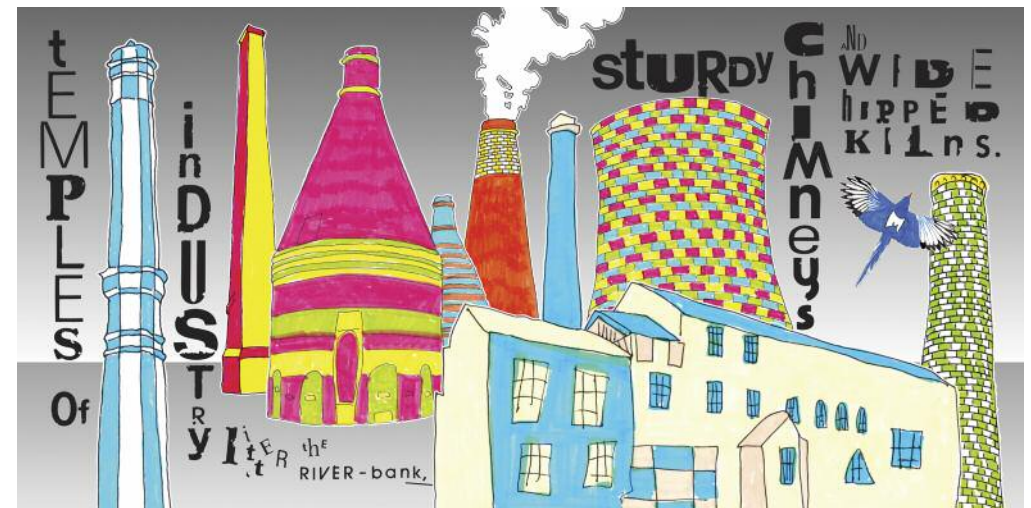
Saint Cuthbert's spire is pointing at Heaven,
Its sandstone stained with smoke and soot.



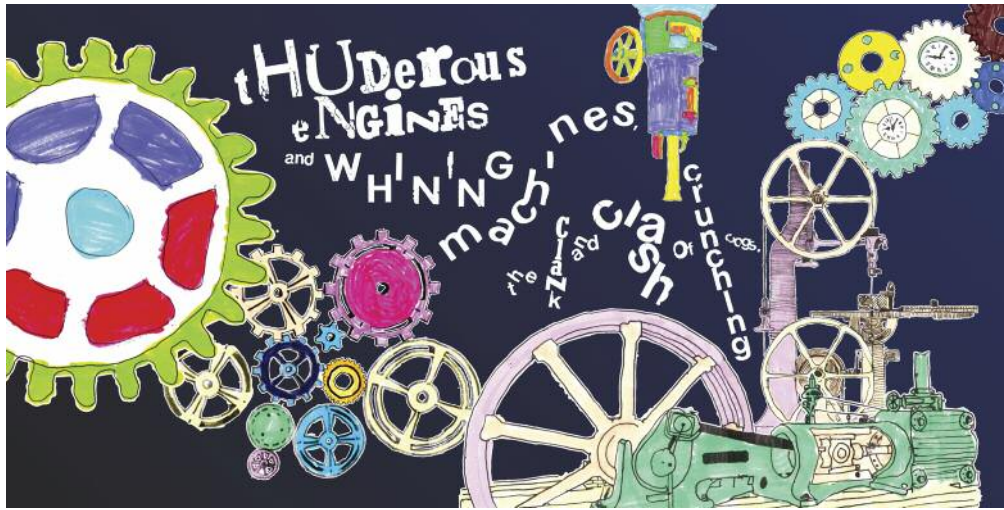
Plum faced housewives braying carpets and scrubbing steps,
Nebbing at the neighbours as they row about nowt.



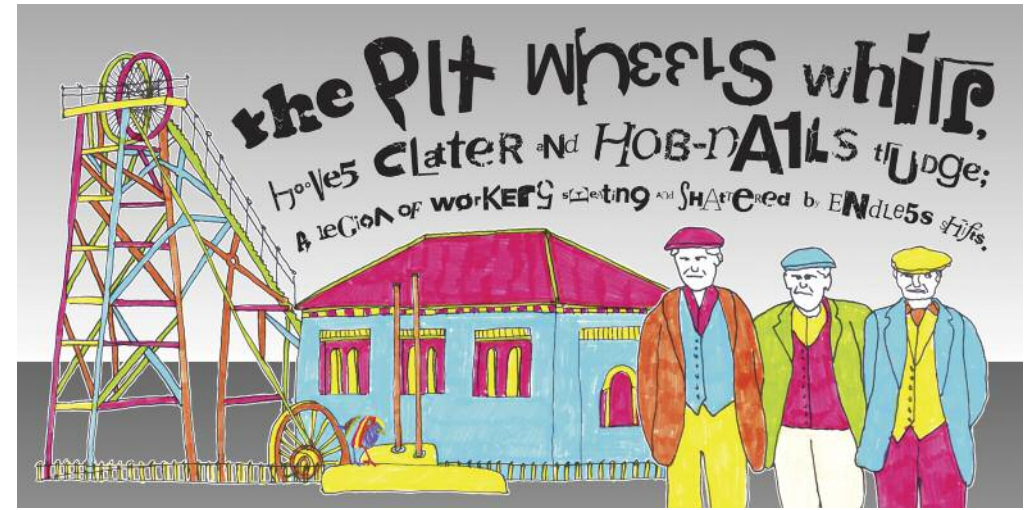
Lassies play chucks in the lane,

Sturdy chimneys and wide hipped kilns.



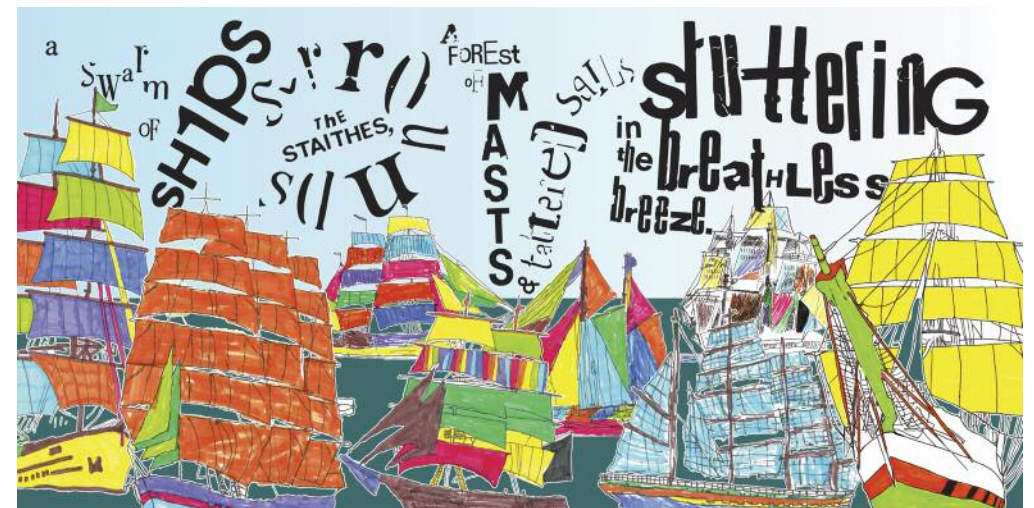
Thunderous engines and whining machines,
The clank and clash of crunching cogs.



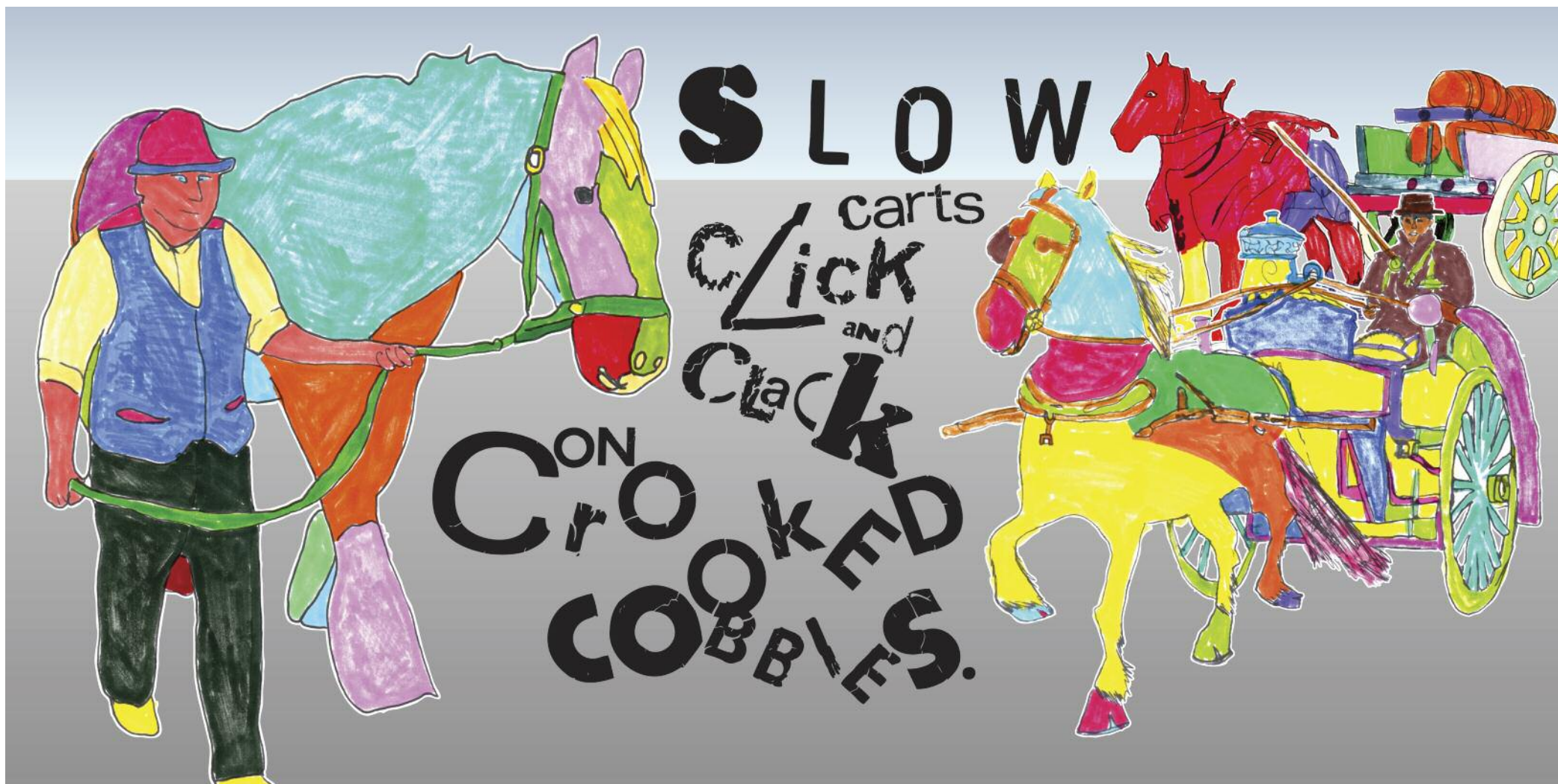
The pit-wheels whirr, hooves clatter and hob-nails trudge;
A legion of workers sweating and shattered by endless shifts.



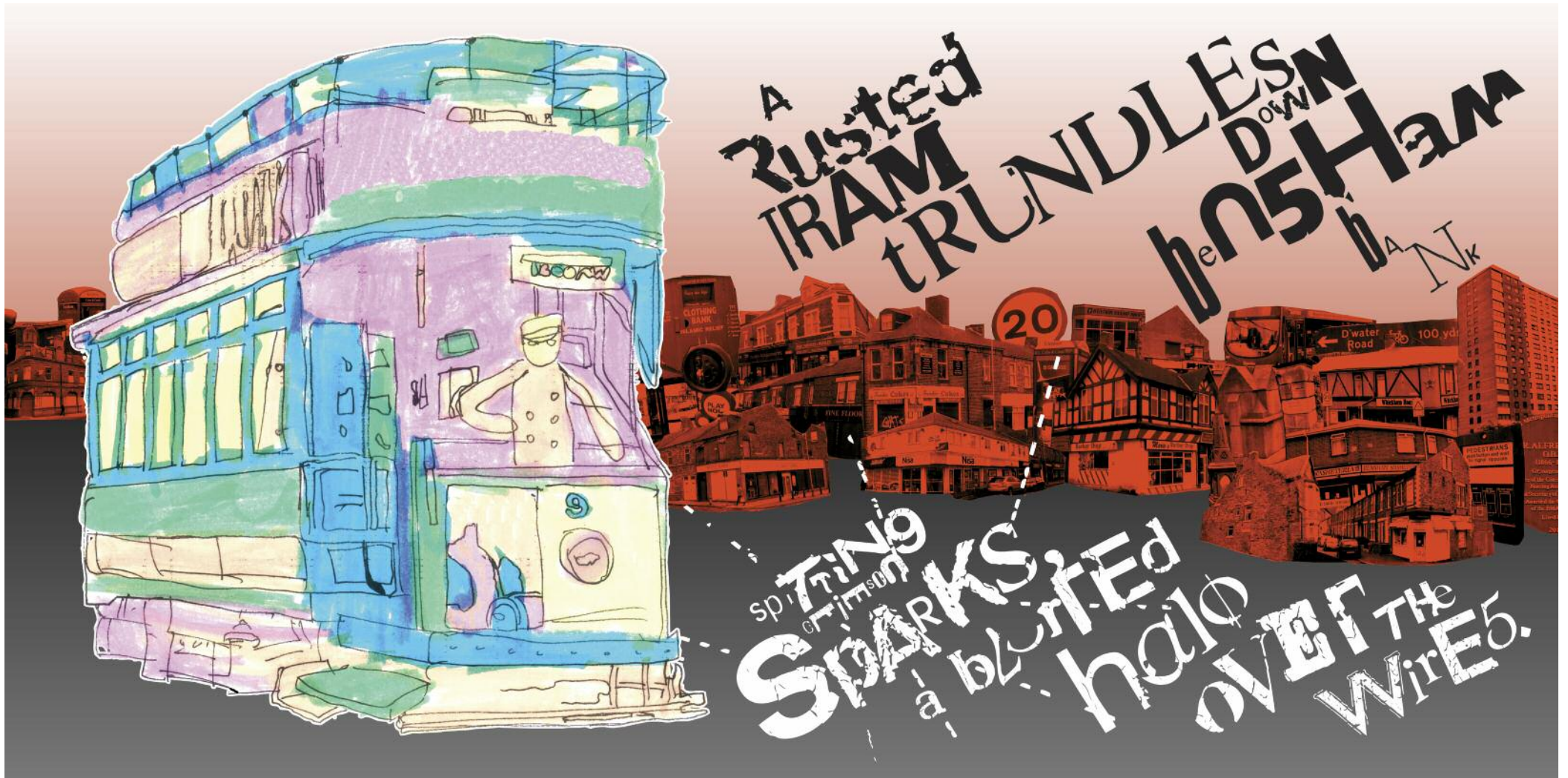
A rickety old mill spins wildly in the rapid wind,
Howling like a wolf at the bulbous moon.



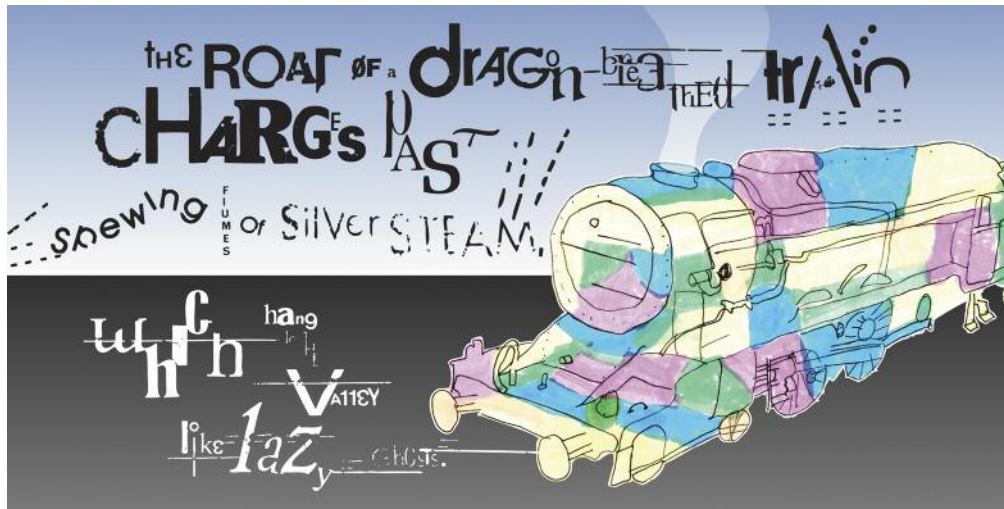
A swarm of ships surrounds the staithe,

Stuttering in a breathless breeze.



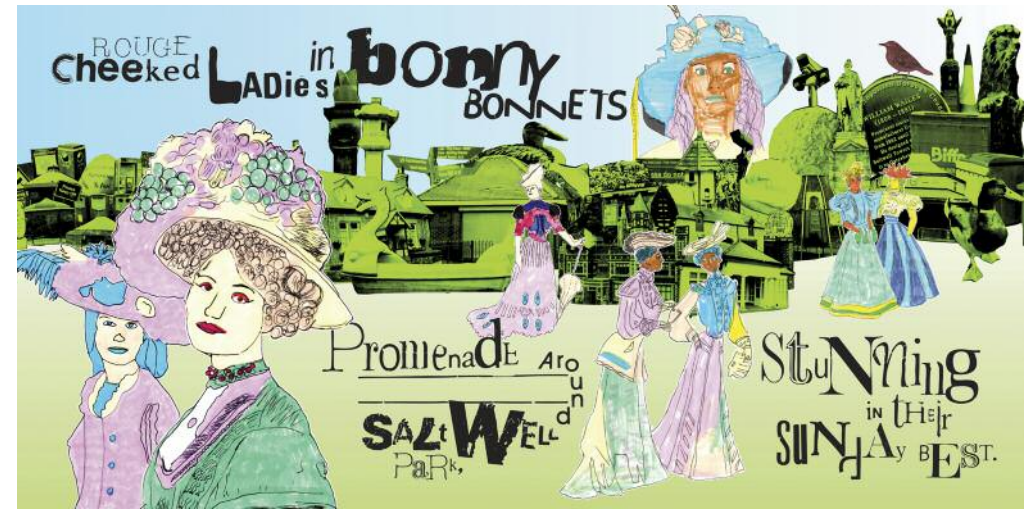
Slow carts click and clack on crooked cobbles.



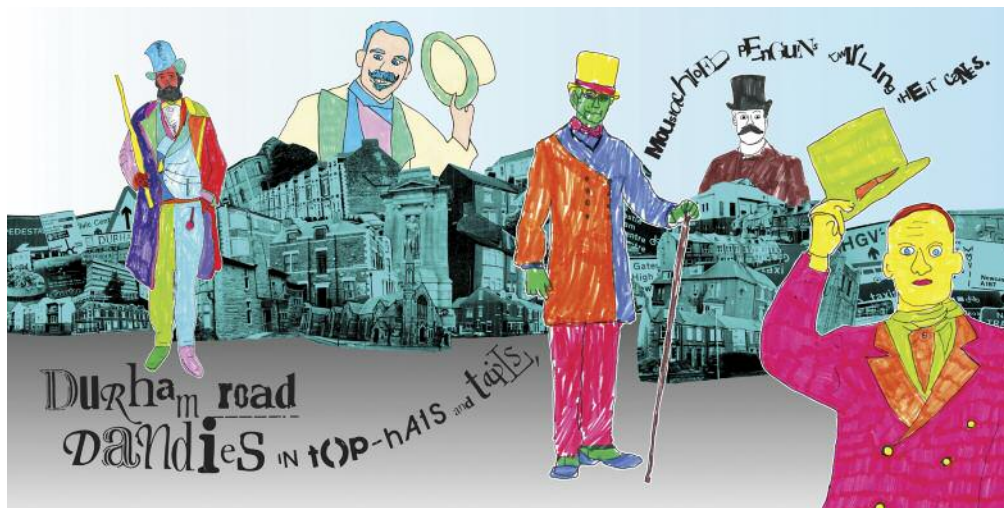
A rusted tram trundles down Bensham Bank

Which hang in the valley like lazy ghosts.



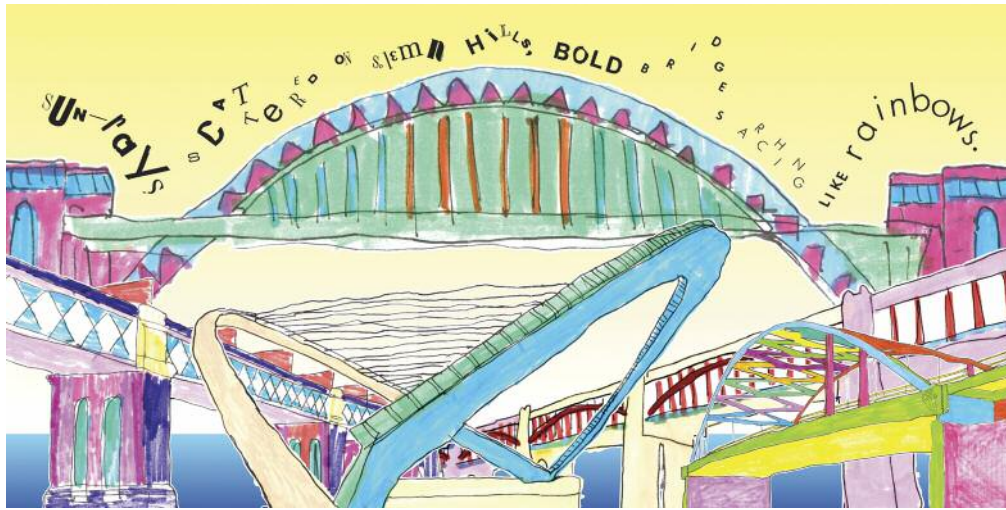
Rouge cheeked ladies in bonny bonnets

Stunning in their Sunday best.



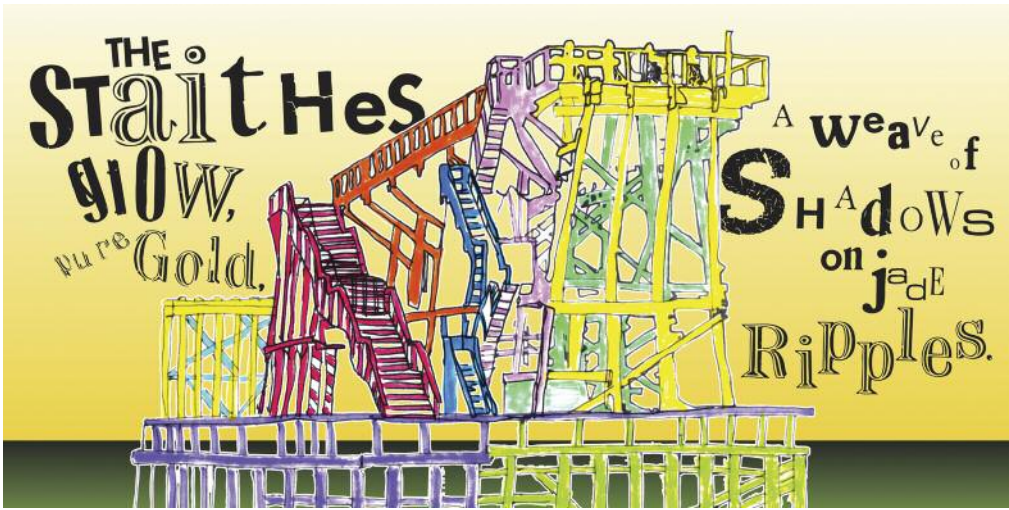
Durham Road dandies in top-hats and tails,
Moustachioed penguins twirling their canes.



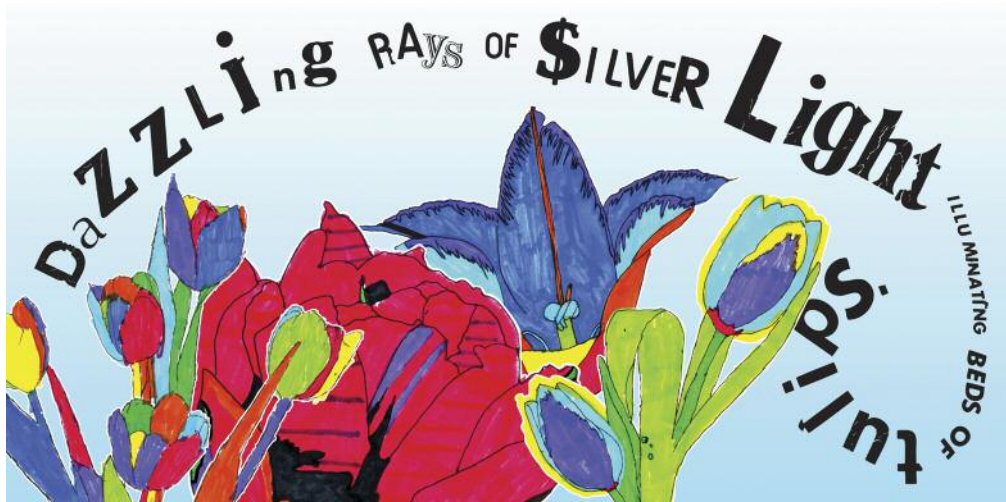
Today the sky is fractured ice,

Dissolving like chalk lines in heavy drizzle.



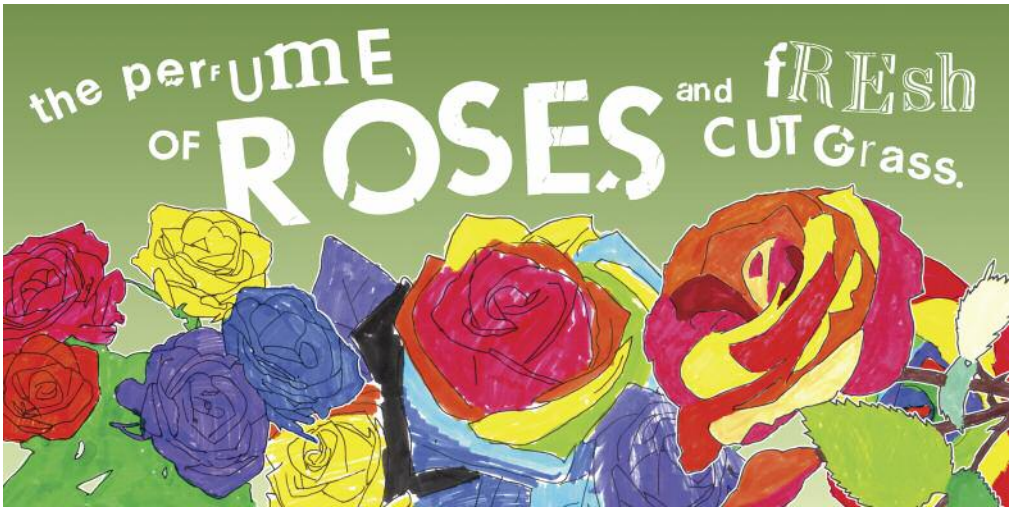
Sun-rays scattered on solemn hills,

Illuminating beds of tulips.



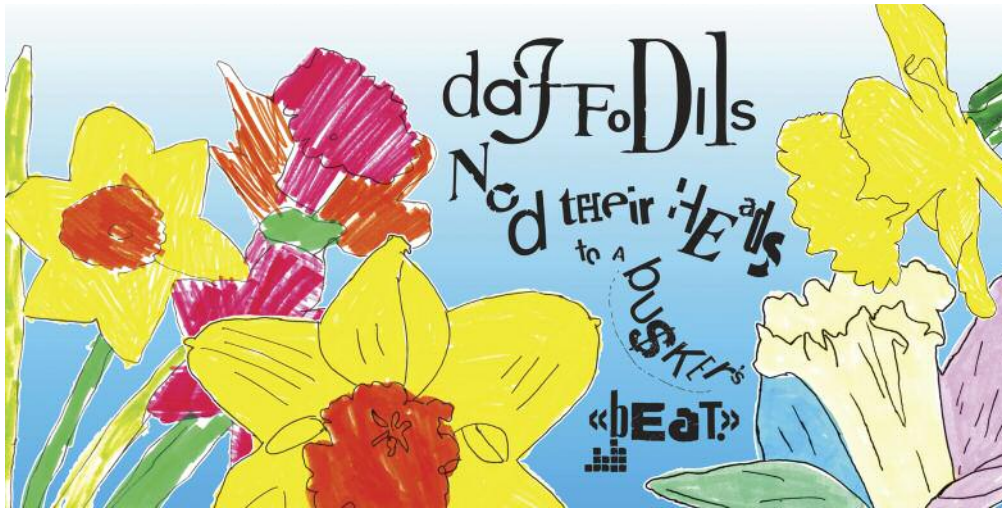
The perfume of roses and fresh cut grass.



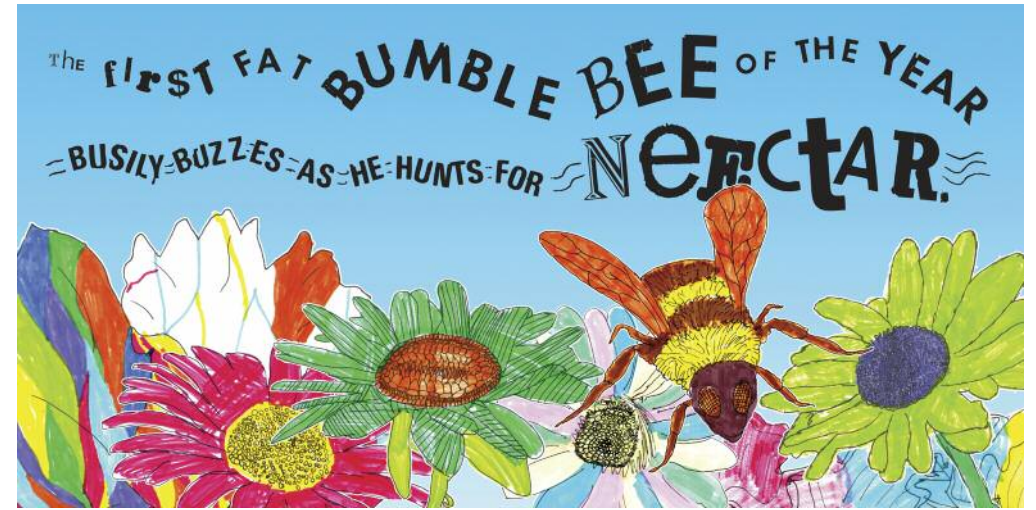
A patchwork of bluebells,

A golden Labrador scampers through the snowdrops.



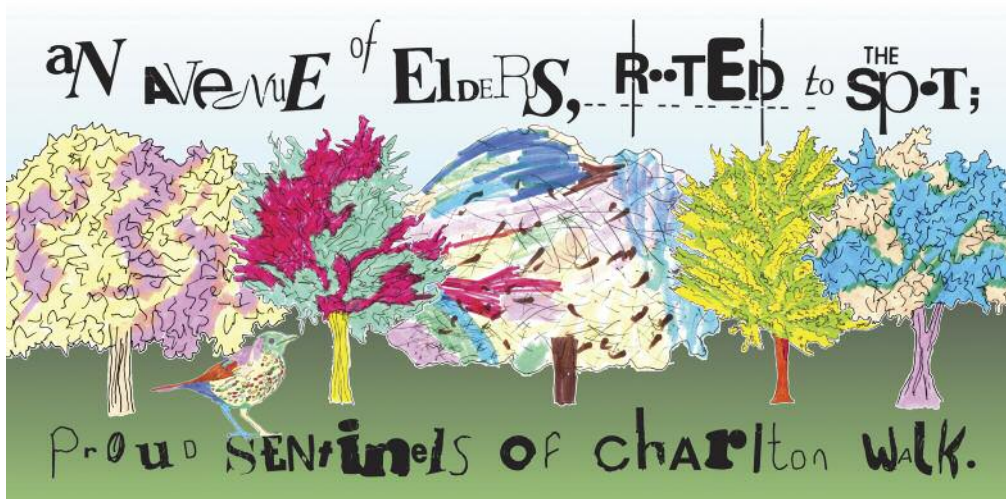
A blossom blizzard of two-tone confetti:

Posing in the summer sun.



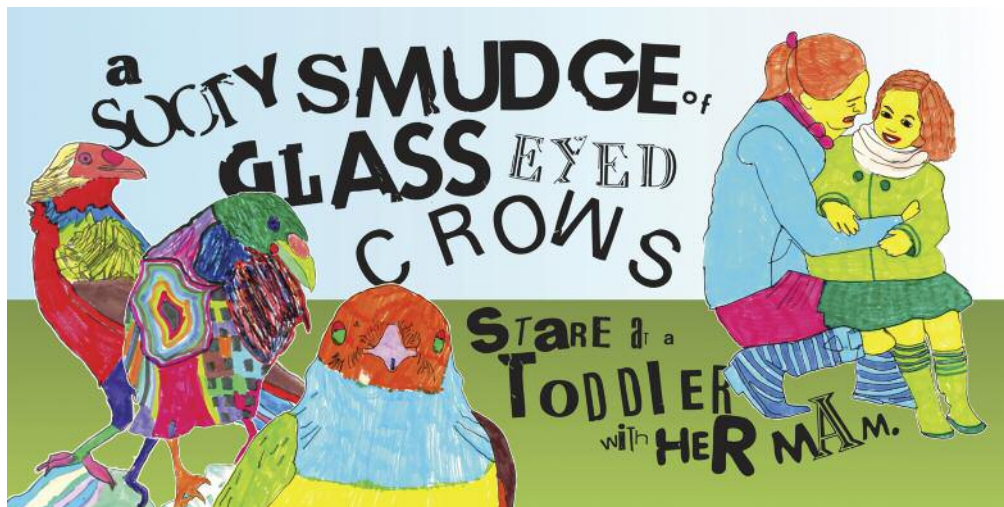
An avenue of elders, rooted to the spot;

Stare at a toddler with her mam.



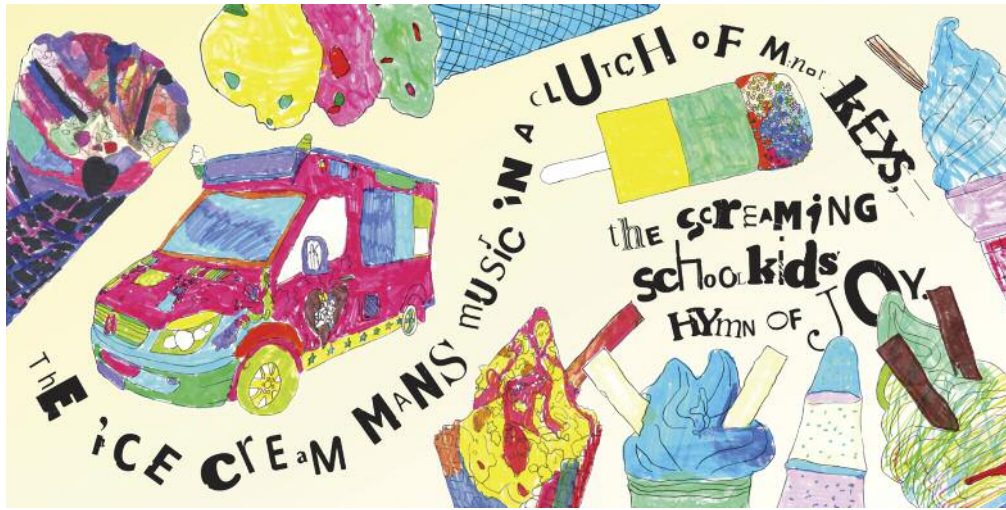
A blackbird sings in Charlton Walk,

Gliding swiftly over silent trees.



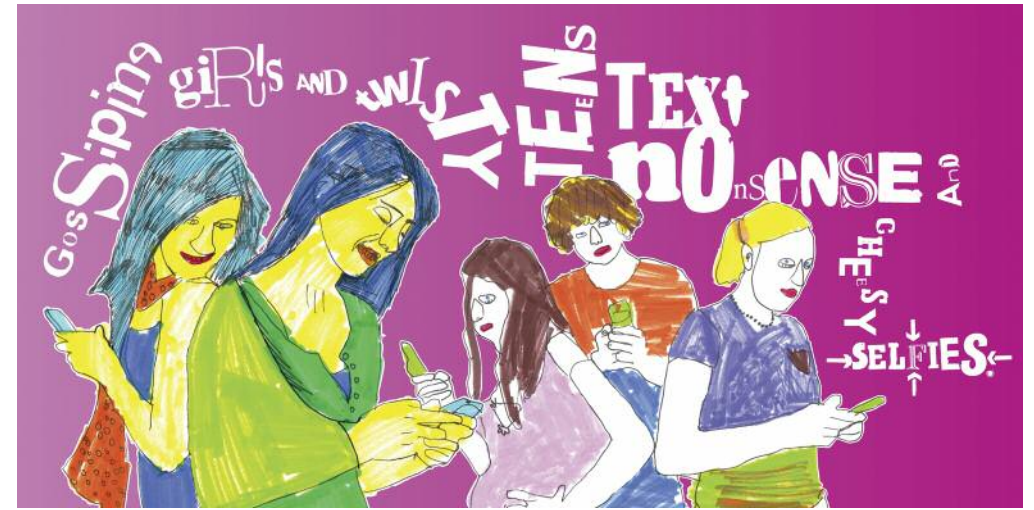
A pair of fledgling magpies

Two for joy.



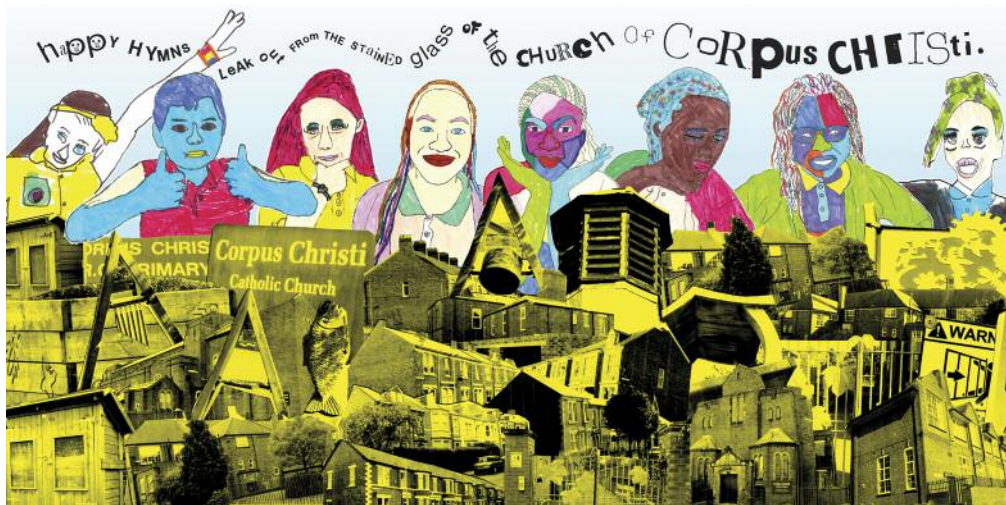
A gaggle of kids,

Play chasey in the park.



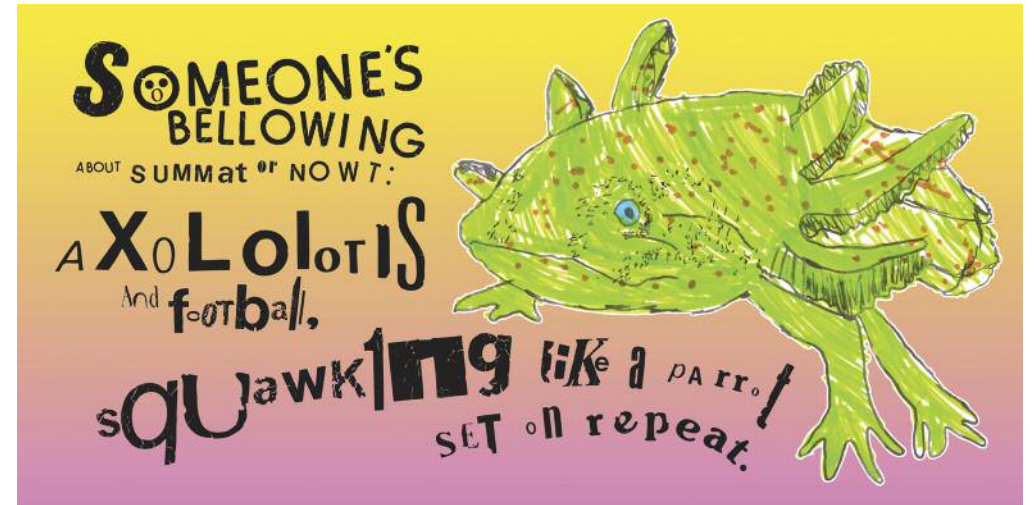
The ice-cream man's music

The screaming schoolkids' hymn of joy.



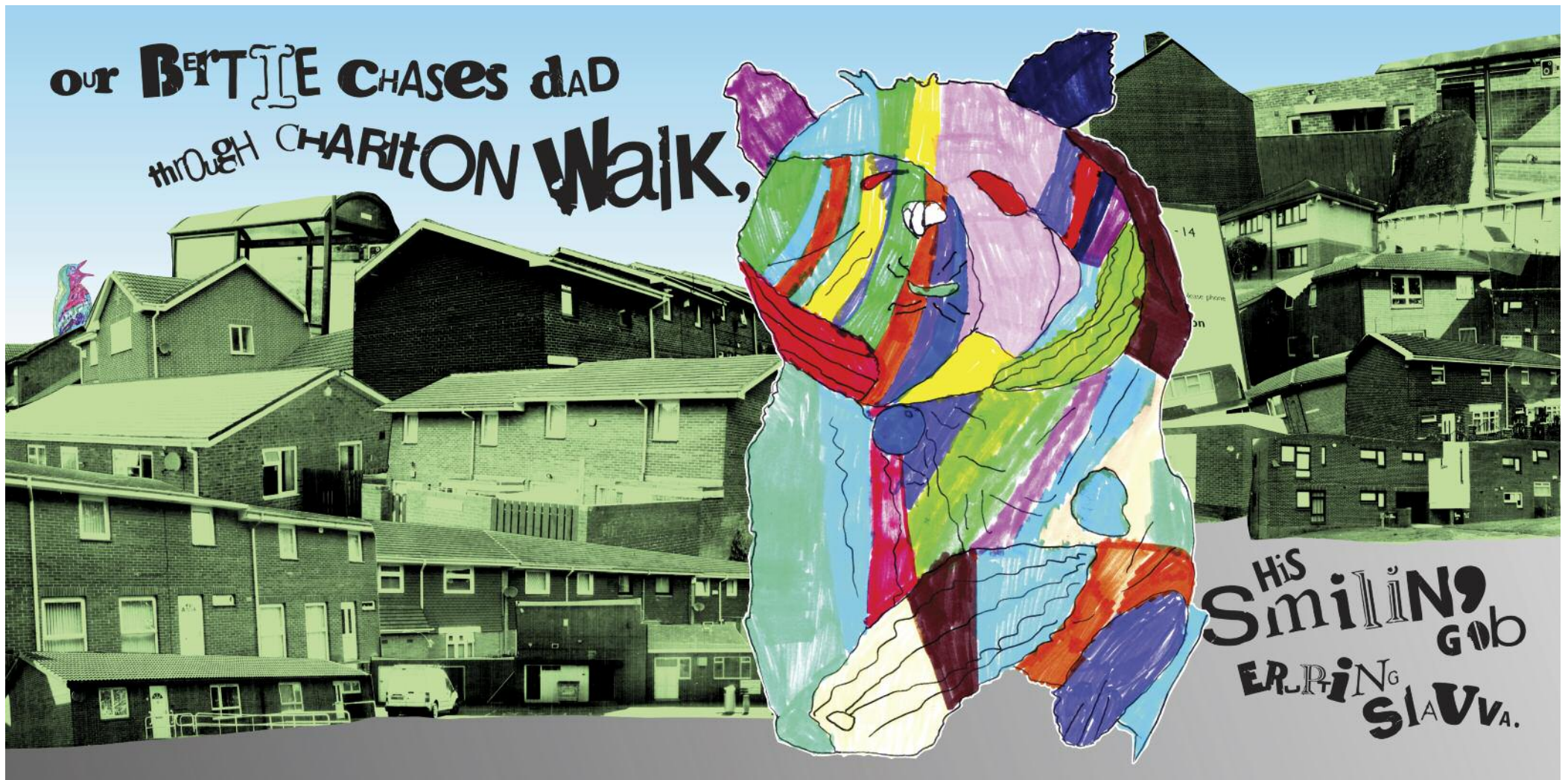
Gossiping girls and twisty teens

Squawking like a parrot set on repeat.



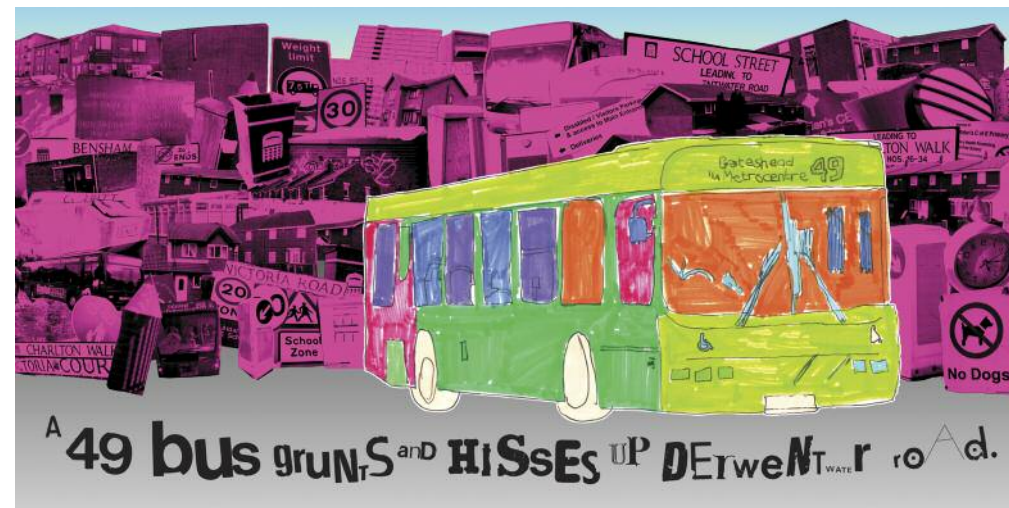
Our Bertie chases dad

His smiling gob erupting slawva.



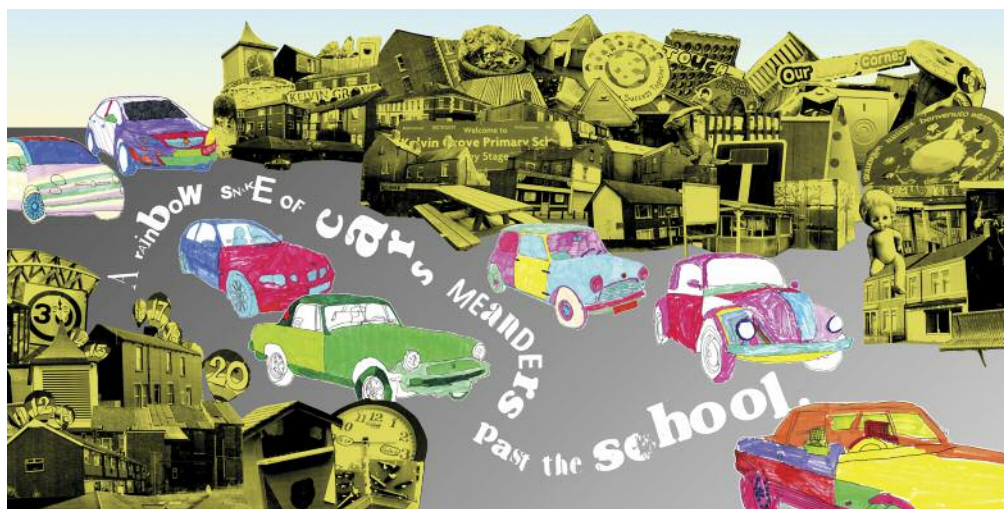
An old banger coughs and splutters as it chugs past the junction,

Exploding like pop-corn.



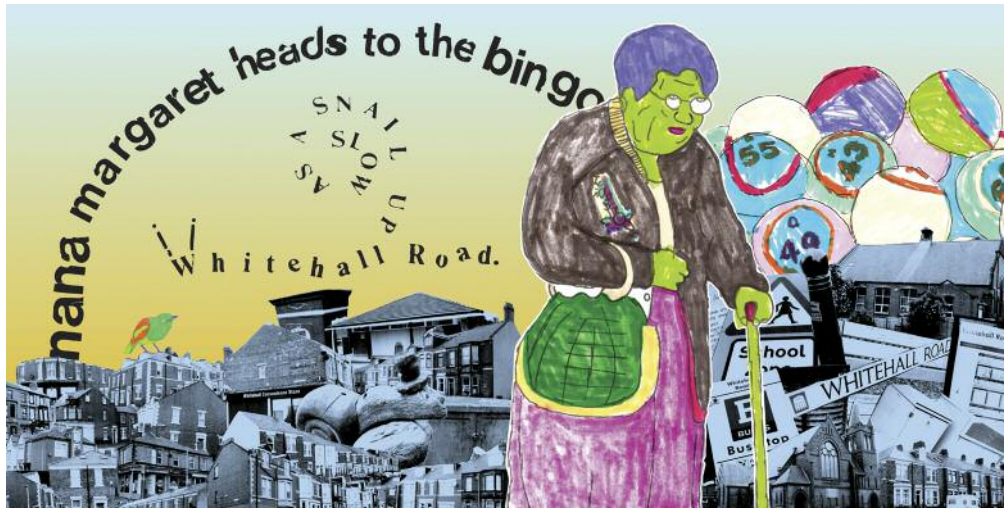
A 49 bus grunts and hisses up Derwentwater Road.



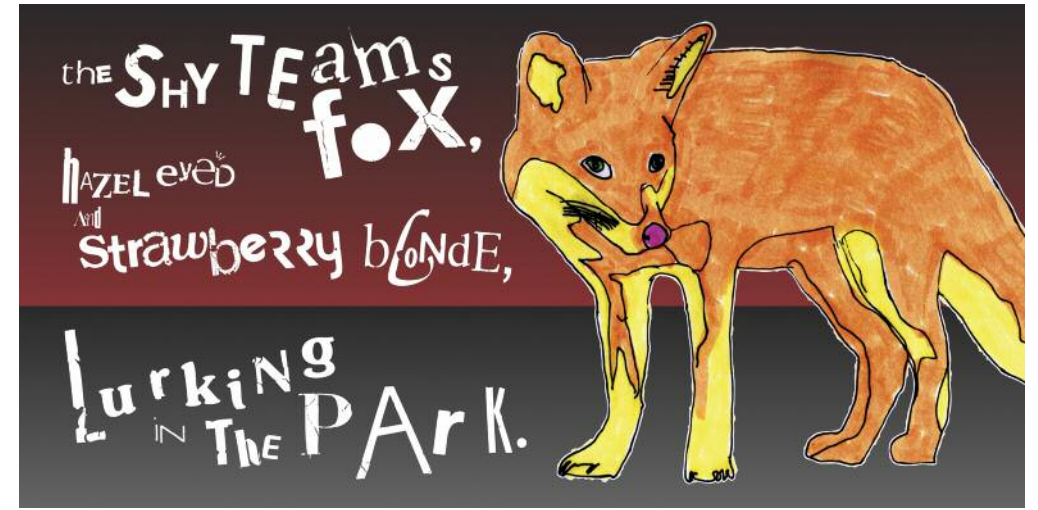
A rainbow snake of cars meanders past the school.
